At the Regional Alliance for Healthy Schools (RAHS), we believe healthy students are better learners. Since our inception, we've worked to remove barriers to care by providing accessible, youth-centered health services directly in schools. Our team—including Nurse Practitioners, Social Workers, Medical Assistants, and Medical Doctors—offers a wide range of physical and behavioral health services, from check-ups and immunizations to dental, vision, and mental health care. In partnership with schools, health departments, and community organizations, we empower students to make informed health decisions and build a foundation for lifelong well-being.

To provide school-based health programs and clinical services that improve the well-being of students, their families, and communities.

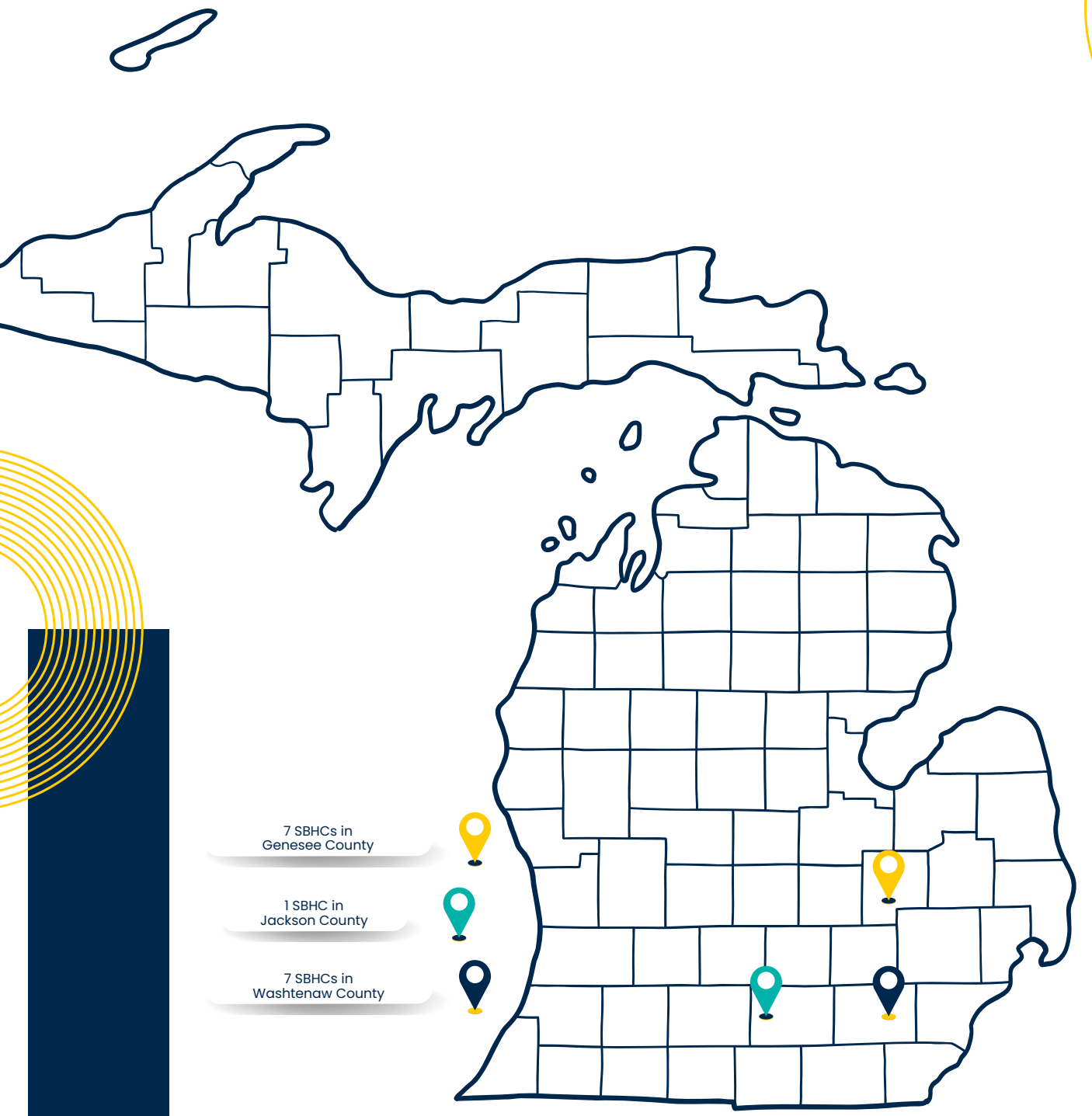
VISION

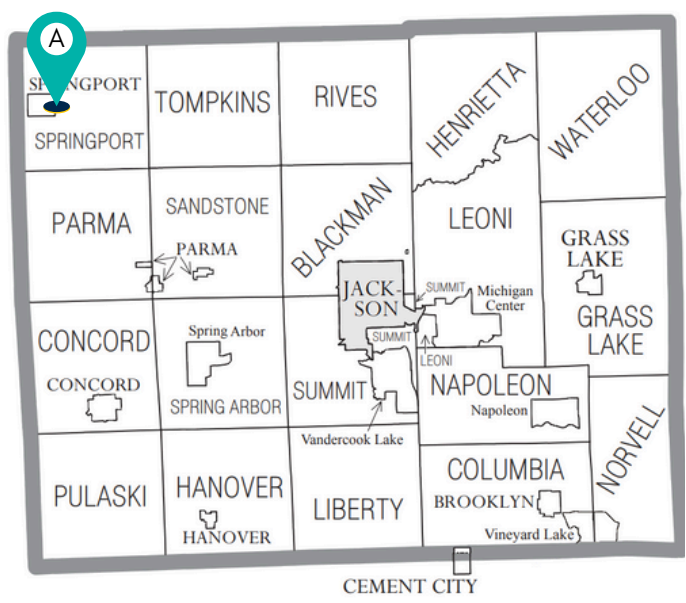

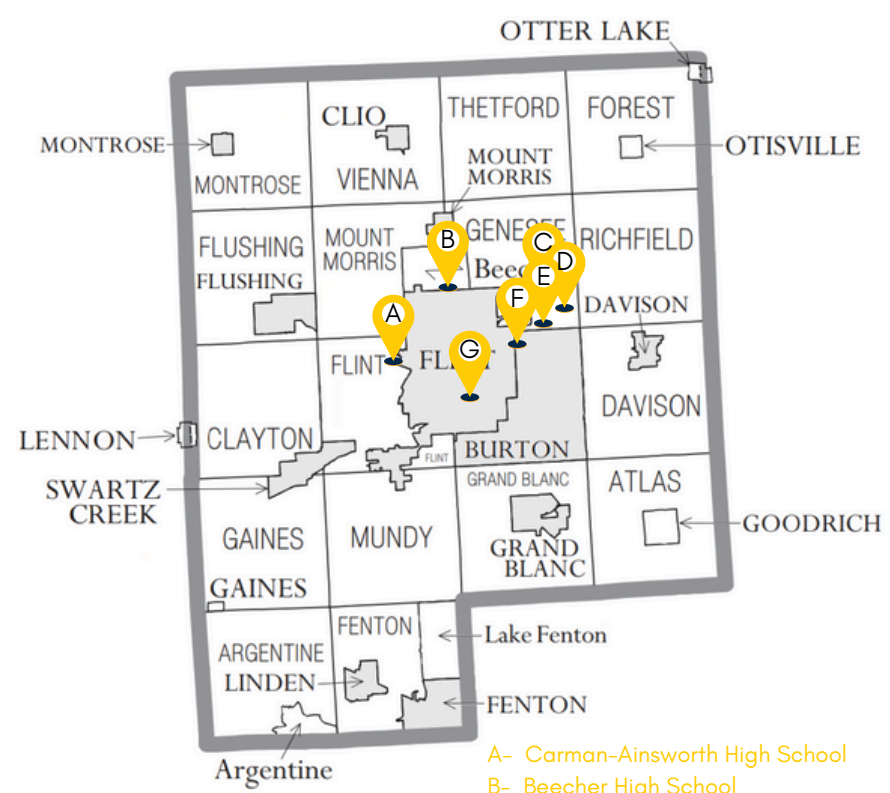

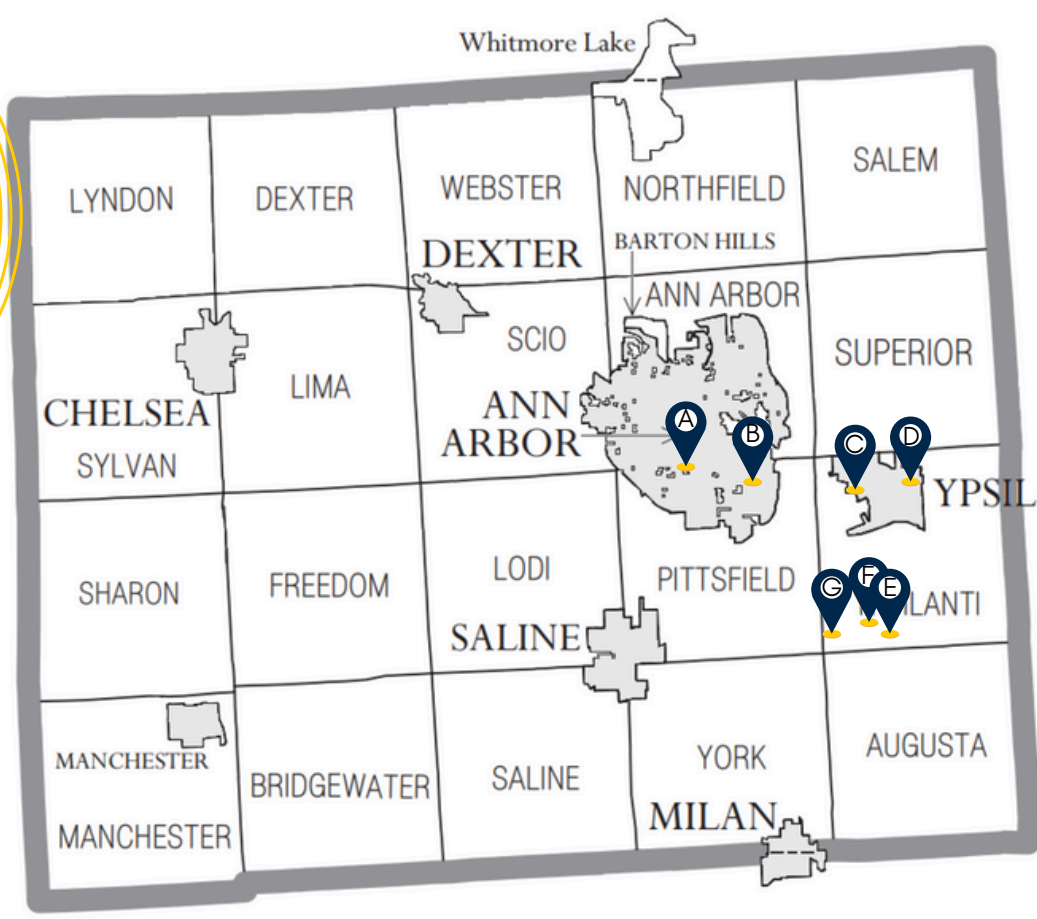

The Regional Alliance for Healthy Schools (RAHS) provides comprehensive primary care services at our school-based health centers to meet the preventive health care needs of the children and adolescents 21 years old and younger in our schools and in our communities. Services include sick visit care, general physicals, sports physicals, immunizations, confidential STI and pregnancy testing, and asthma care.



Behavioral Health Impact



RAHS Patients return to class reducing absenteeism and contributing to students' seat time

The Regional Alliance for Healthy Schools (RAHS) made significant strides in addressing the behavioral health needs of children and adolescents in FY24. RAHS school-based health centers provide essential support through individual and group psychotherapy, crisis intervention, and early intervention classroom-based psychotherapy education programs for youth in the school environment, making it more accessible and reducing barriers for those seeking help.



Vision & Dental & Immunizations

The RAHS Mobile Unit brings vision and dental health services to youth and adolescents on site at RAHS school-based health centers, reducing missed class time, eliminating transportation barriers for youth, as well as time off work for parents and guardians.

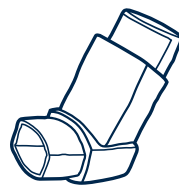
RAHS also provides vision services at the Ypsilanti Community High School health center. Patients begin with a screening performed by a health center clinician; those requiring further examination receive a full eye exam. For those in need of eye glasses, or a replacement pair, glasses are provided at no out-of-pocket cost.

RAHS collaborates with Mott Children's Health Center to offer dental care services to youth 21 years old and younger, ensuring comprehensive healthcare accessibility.
